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PMGKAY: A Giant Hug from PM Modi

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Modi's Decade: Economic Milestones; reforms that changed Bharat's future

As India reflects on nearly a decade under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, it becomes apparent that his tenure has left an indelible mark on the nation's economy. With opinions sharply divided between staunch supporters and ardent critics of "Modinomics," there is no denying that Modi's tenure has been marked by a relentless pursuit of economic reforms and a commitment to ushering in change.

One of the hallmark achievements of Modi's economic agenda wasthe successful implementation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST). This monumental reform aimed to simplify India's complex tax structure by unifying various state and central taxes into a comprehensive tax. Since its inception, the taxpayer base has nearly doubled, and tax collections have shown consistent growth.

In April, GST collections soared to an all-time monthly high of ₹1.87 lakh crore, marking a 12% increase from the previous year. Furthermore, a majority of large states reported impressive GST growth rates exceeding 20%. This data suggests a broad-based economic growth across sectors and regions. Additionally, the generation of 90 million e-way bills in March 2023, an 11% increase from the preceding month, underscores the growing economic activity facilitated by the GST.

Narendra Modi's tenure witnessed an unparalleled integration of technology into governance and financial systems. The Unified Payment Interface (UPI), introduced by his government, revolutionized India's economy by

enabling digital payments even in remote villages. Behind this digital payments infrastructure lies India Stack, a set of open APIs and digital public goods that harness the economic potential of identity, data, and payments on a massive scale. Key components of India Stack include Aadhaar, UPI, Digilocker, and the CoWin Vaccination Platform.

The core principle of India Stack is to reduce transaction costs, ensuring that India's vast population gains access to crucial services, both public and private. UPI, in particular, has empowered private sector innovation based on digital payments. India's tech-enabled governance is now a global exemplar, with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) acknowledaina its role in the supporting formalization of the Indian economy and reducing leakages through digital platforms like Aadhaar.

Another game-changing initiative under Modi's leadership has been the Direct Benefits Transfer (DBT) scheme. This program leveraged the "JAM" trinity (Jan Dhan, Aadhar, Mobile) to transfer subsidies directly to beneficiaries' bank accounts. This approach tackled the age-old problem of leakage and delay in subsidy disbursement.

Before DBT, it was estimated that only 15 paise of every rupee allocated by the central government reached the intended beneficiaries. DBT's efficient and transparent process has not only saved the 85 paise that used to go missing but also increased financial inclusion in India. The government reported saving \$27 billion through DBT across key central government schemes, highlighting its impact in reducing corruption and enhancing efficiency.

The Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC) introduced in 2016 brought about a paradigm shift in resolving bankruptcy cases in India. Previously, companies in bankruptcy proceedings could languish for years without resolution. The IBC provided a market-linked, time-bound mechanism for addressing stressed assets, enabling efficient loan recovery for banks.

While the IBC has improved overall institutional capacity, some challenges persist. Delays in the resolution process have increased due to legal disputes and a shortage of tribunal benches. According to data from the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Board of India (IBBI), cases resolved under the IBC until December 2022 took, on average, 482 days, exceeding the stipulated maximum of 270 days for corporate bankruptcy resolution. Despite these challenges, the IBC has

significantly enhanced the efficiency of debt recovery mechanisms.

The Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) Scheme, initiated during Modi's tenure, aims to boost domestic production in sectors where India has a comparative advantage. This strategic move seeks to strengthen domestic manufacturing, create resilient supply chains, enhance competitiveness, and increase export potential. The PLI Scheme is expected to drive production and employment growth, benefitting not only large industries but also the micro, small, and medium-sized enterprises (MSMEs) ecosystem.

When Modi launched the "Make in India" program in 2014, skeptics doubted India's ability to become a manufacturing powerhouse. However, the PLI Scheme, coupled with India's growing manufacturing capabilities and evolving geopolitical dynamics, is now attracting global companies like Apple to set up manufacturing units in India. This underscores the country's potential as a manufacturing hub.

India's logistics costs have traditionally been high, constituting 13% of GDP compared to 8% in developed economies. To enhance India's global competitiveness, Modi's government has initiated a comprehensive logistics policy aimed at reducing these costs. The National Logistics Policy seeks to improve logistics efficiency, align with global benchmarks by 2030, and create a data-driven decision support mechanism.

Investments in infrastructure, technology, and soft and hard infrastructure have already begun to yield results. India climbed six places in the World Bank's Logistic Performance Index 2023, ranking 38 out of 139 countries, up from 44 in 2018. This indicates that India's logistics sector is becoming more efficient, enhancing its global trade prospects.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's economic initiatives and reforms have undeniably left a profound impact on India's economy. A prominent testament to this commitment is the provision of ex-gratia payments ranging from Rs. 25 to 45 lakhs to the next of kin of martyred soldiers. The Army Central Welfare Fund further extends an amount of Rs. 8,00,000 complemented by ex-gratia amounts from

various state governments. This financial support, coupled with Liberalised Family Pension and regular service benefits, ensures a substantial safety net for the families of the martyrs.

Moreover, the government has taken significant steps towards educational support, providing financial aid and scholarships for dependent children of martyrs. The reservation of seats in Medical and Dental Colleges for the wards of defense personnel, particularly those whose family members were killed in action, is a noteworthy opportunity extended by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. With a total allocation of 42 MBBS seats and 3 BDS seats, this initiative aims to secure educational opportunities for the families of martyrs.

In addition to educational support, the government has extended employment reservations in Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) and public sector banks. SAFAL outlets have been established for widows and dependents of service personnel in the Delhi-NCR region, providing opportunities for their livelihood. The Ministry of Petroleum & Natural Gas has allocated an 8% guota for the allotment of LPG distributorships and petrol/diesel retail outlets for defense personnel, including widows and dependents of Armed Forces members who lost their lives in service.

In the same year, a pivotal decision was made during the meeting of the National Executive Committee of the BJP in Bhopal to send a 'study team' to the Kashmir Valley for an on-the-spot assessment of the prevailing situation. From September 19th to 22nd, 1992, Modi, then the BJP Gujarat General Secretary, accompanied Madan Lal Khurana and Chaman Lal Gupta on a 4-day intensive tour of the Kashmir Valley.

The report produced by the 'Kashmir Study Team' covered all aspects plaguing Kashmir at that time, including policy paralysis, lack of will. extremists taking political over administration appointments, unprecedented levels of corruption, lack of tax collection, and instances extremism. This multifaceted of understanding became crucial for Modi's future the policymaking, setting stage for

comprehensive integration of Kashmir with the Union of India during his tenure as Prime Minister.

Throughout the 1990s, Modi continued to immerse himself in the local culture, spending a significant amount of time living among the people. Fifty years ago when India was gearing up to wage the Liberation War that would deliver linguistic freedom to hundreds of thousands of Bengalis living in the then East Pakistan, no one would have imagined that the land of Sheikh Mujibur Rahman would one day be polarised by communal flames, that too within decades, to witness one of the most heinous attacks on the religious freedom of Bengali Hindus during the peak of their main festival, the Durga Puja.

The violent attacks on the Durga Puja celebrations as well as on Iskcon temples across Bangladesh recently bear the ominous warning that the country has undergone a obscurantist change as much water has flown in the river Padma. (The Ganga, after flowing into Bangladesh, is known as the Padma.) That the minority population such as Hindus would not be safe under the rule of the Awami League, led by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, cannot be a concern only for India, which is the biggest home for the Hindus in the world.

also throws light on how the rapid radicalisation of Muslims, as had been advocated by a section of the political class, including the ruling dispensation, has turned Bangladesh into a major contributor to the quiet rise of Islamic fundamentalism in the Indian subcontinent, which has borne the brunt of terrorism time and again in the past. Extremist outfits like the JamaatulMujahideen Bangladesh and its dark shadow have made deep inroads into the rural areas of the country to make it a hard-line Islamic state.

This unprecedented development triggered repercussions in India like a wildfire for obvious reasons. The ruling BJP, which brags about championing the cause of Hindutva, lost no opportunity in portraying how vulnerable Hindus have become outside the country, while making the loudest possible outcry globally. It also pointed fingers at the silence of several other Opposition political leaders, including Mamata Banerjee, chief minister of West Bengal, who is

known to politically champion the cause of Muslims and is also known as a good friend of Sheikh Hasina.

However, the top leaders of the including the members of the Union Cabinet, have not been at all vocal on the issue. This is reflected in the muteness of its main faces in the government. Startina from Prime Minister Narendra Modi to Union home minister Amit Shah external affairs minister Subrahmanyam Jaishankar, all have stayed away from lending their voice to their party's clamour for justice to the Hindus of Bangladesh. The external affairs ministry, in fact, responded to the situation by just sending out a stern message of concern to Bangladesh at the diplomatic level. This is perhaps a rare occasion in the past seven years of BJP rule when the party and its government did not appear to be on the same page, at least in public. While many in the party and beyond keep on guessing the reasons for this, bilateral relations, others feel, have emerged as the main obligation for the sake of the country's long-term interests. To the BJP and the RSS, the nation has always come first and on top above all in the agenda. There is no doubt that Prime Minister Modi and Mr Shah are the products of the same ideology. What they choose to do is, therefore, bound by the government they run. The pivot of

their stand lies in "Azaadi Ka Amrut Mahotsav", a year-long celebration that has been underway across the country to mark its military victory over Pakistan fifty years ago that led to the birth of Bangladesh on December 16, 1971. It may be noted that Mr Modi himself launched the celebrations in 2020 to uphold and consolidate India's deep bonds with Bangladesh which, apart from being hit by radicalism, is also being avidly wooed by China for its expansionist dreams. This year-long event is due to conclude December 16 this year, when the top political representatives from Bangladesh expected to participate. Any critical reaction by the Prime Minister on a specific and untoward issue across the border would have certainly worsened the mood in the run-up to the grand culmination of the celebration in the national capital. Had he broken his silence, it might also have become a point of discord in the long run diplomatically the between two nations, especially after Sheikh Hasina has harshly condemned the communal violence herself, and launched stringent action against the offenders. For Prime Minister Modi and for India, Bangladesh is not merely just another neighbouring country. It is a land which he has visited himself and which has an old connection politically, economically and culturally with India, above anything. That is

why when Hindus came under attack there, the Prime Minister also averted a diplomatic crisis like a statesman by dealing with the situation at the governmental instead of at the party level.

years to 21 years is one such example where the PM has fulfilled one of his promises.

He has kept his word again just like he did earlier where he ensured the abolition of Triple Talaq by law, to empower Muslim women and to let them live with their heads high.

15 August 2020, Modi. in his Independence Day address from the Red Fort, announced that the marriage of women at the right time had become the need of the hour to save them from malnutrition at a young age. Till now the marriageable age for men is 21 years, while for women it is 18 years in our country. But there was hardly anyone who had any inkling that the PM had plans to remove the disparity in the marriageable age between the two genders at the earliest even as the coronavirus pandemic was at its peak in the country at that time.

Several old-school believers had also assumed there would be no effect of change because what was in existence was perfect. They were, however, in for a surprise when the Union cabinet last month approved equality in the legal age for marriage between men and women. They are so aghast that they are refusing to accept it.

One of them was All India Muslim Personal Law Board general secretary Maulana Khalid Saifullah Rahmani. Within days of PM Modi's historic step, he stated, "Marriage is an important need of human life. But no particular age can be considered as a criterion for the age of the marriage, while it has to do with health and wellbeing, it also has to do with the protection of moral values in the society and the protection of the society from moral depravity. That is why not only in Islam but also in other religions, no age of marriage has been fixed. It has been kept at the discretion of both the contracting parties and their guardians."

He added, "If a boy or a girl feels the need for marriage before the age of 21 and can pay the obligations imposed after the marriage, then forbidding him from marriage is cruelty and interference in the personal freedom of an adult. This can lead to an increase in crime in society. Setting a minimum age of 18 years or 21 years for marriage and declaring marriage illegal before that is neither in the interest of girls nor is it good for society. On the contrary, it can severely damage moral values. Anyway, the trend of getting married at a young age is slowly disappearing. But sometimes situations arise in which it is in the interest of the girl to get married before the prescribed age. Therefore, All India Muslim Personal Law Board demands the

government to refrain from making such useless and harmful laws."

But, what a person like Rahmani did not know was that the PM had already started working on his path-breaking step much before he gave a prelude to the nation. A task force was constituted by the Centre in June 2020. It was headed by Jaya Jaitley in the Niti Aayog. Eminent pediatrician V K Paul was also its member. Apart from them, the secretaries of the Union ministries of Health and Family Welfare, Women Child Development, and Education, School Education and Literacy Mission and the Justice and Law were also made members of the panel.

In December 2020, the task force submitted a report to the Centre. It advocated that the minimum age of women at the time of giving birth to their first child should be 21 years while underlining that delay in marriage has a positive impact on the economic, social and health of families, women, children and society. Thus a proposal resulted in the decision which Modi envisioned once.

This has also validated a quiet social revolution which was long due in the country's family welfare scenario. For women's empowerment, it is a welcome step. A check of Modi's plan shows that the change came in less

than a year-and-a-half. It has also outwitted the opposition.

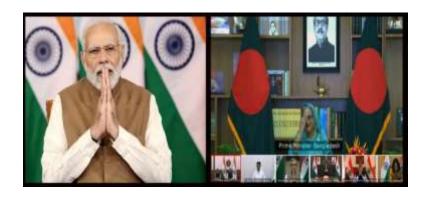
The task ahead before the central government now is to fructify the action plan while attempting to take those who oppose it, in the interest of brighter prospects of the ambitious scheme. 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Developments in Legislation During Narendra Modi's Decade

m T}$ he period under Prime Minister Narendra has Modi's leadership been a time of constitutional and legislative evolution. From 2014 onwards, the government has introduced a series of reforms that modernized India's legal framework, streamlined economic processes, and redefined social norms. Simple yet profound, these reforms have touched the lives of every Indian and transformed the country's constitutional history. After assuming office by Modiji in 2014, the era of development started in Bharat including the constitutional reforms, which entirely eased the citizens of the nation. This

constitutional reform started with the Constitution (99th Amendment) Act, 2014, which was a significant amendment in India's constitutional history. It established the National Judicial Appointments Commission (NJAC), which was intended to replace the existing collegium system for the appointment of judges to the higher judiciary. The amendment led to the creation of the NJAC, a body that would be responsible for the appointment and transfer of judges to the Supreme Court and High Courts. The commission was to consist of the Chief Justice of India as the ex officio chairperson, two other senior judges of the Supreme Court, the Union Minister of Law and Justice, and two eminent persons.

The reformation didn't halt, in 2015, the Constitution (100th Amendment) Act, 2015. facilitated the operationalization of the 1974 India-Bangladesh Land Boundary Agreement (LBA) and its 2011 Protocol. India received 51 Bangladeshi enclaves covering 7,110 acres, while received 111 Indian Bangladesh enclaves covering 17,160 acres. It amended the First Schedule of the Constitution to legally transfer the territories as per the agreement. The residents of these enclaves were given the choice to either remain in their current location or move to the country of their choice. The physical exchange of enclaves was completed in phases between July 31, 2015, and June 30, 2016.

The 101st Amendment Act, of 2016 is another significant amendment to the Constitution of India that introduced the Goods and Services Tax (GST). This Act streamlined and rationalized the complex web of indirect taxes prevalent in India. It sought to replace multiple indirect taxes levied by both the Union and State Governments with a single comprehensive tax – the GST. The primary objectives were to eliminate the cascading effect of taxes (where taxes are levied on taxes) and create a common national market for goods and services. The amendment subsumed various Central and State taxes, including Central Excise Duty, Additional Excise Duties, Service Tax, State Value Added Tax (VAT)/Sales Tax, Entertainment Tax, Central Sales Tax, Octroi and Entry tax, Luxury tax, and Taxes on lottery, betting, and gambling.

The amendment dispensed with the concept of 'declared goods of special importance' under the Constitution. It introduced the levy of IGST on inter-state transactions of goods and services. An additional tax (not exceeding one percent) was imposed on the supply of goods during inter-state trade or commerce, collected by the Government of India and assigned to the States of origin. The GST system has simplified tax compliance for businesses, reduced tax evasion,

and facilitated seamless movement of goods across State borders. It has transformed the way businesses operate, and promoted efficiency and transparency.

Modi's era witnessed other legislative reforms which rocketed up the underprivileged citizens through legislation. After the 101st Amendment Act, there have been several other amendments to the Constitution of India, each contributes to the ongoing evolution of the nation's legal and social framework including 102nd the Amendment Act, of 2018 which provided constitutional status to the National Commission for Backward Classes (NCBC). This move ensured greater representation and opportunities for marginalized communities. Later, Amendment Act, 2019 was enacted with the goal of advancing economically weaker sections (EWS) in educational institutions and public employment, this amendment introduced a 10% reservation for EWS candidates. Through such amendments, the government promoted inclusivity and equal access to opportunities for all sections of society.

Another milestone was the 104th Amendment Act, 2020 which extended the reservation of seats for Scheduled Castes (SCs) and Scheduled Tribes (STs) in the Lok Sabha and state assemblies from seventy years to eighty years, this

amendment sought to uphold and reinforce the representation of these communities in the legislative bodies. It aimed to ensure continued participation and empowerment of SCs and STs in the democratic process. The pivotal 105th Amendment Act, 2021 devolved the power to identify and specify socially and educationally backward classes (SEBCs) to the states, a responsibility previously held by the central government. This amendment facilitates a more localized and responsive approach to address the needs of backward communities. Also, Modiji's demonetization in November 2016 tackled corruption and counterfeit currency, while the Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC) of 2016 addressed banking sector issues.

Agricultural Reforms: The Farmers' Produce Commerce (Promotion Trade and Facilitation) Act, 2020 provides for the creation of an ecosystem where the farmers and traders enjoy the freedom of choice relating to the sale and purchase of farmers' produce which prices facilitates remunerative through competitive alternative trading channels; to promote efficient, transparent and barrier-free inter-State and intra-State trade and commerce of farmers' produce outside the physical premises of markets or deemed markets notified under various State agricultural produce market legislations; and to provide a facilitative framework for electronic trading.

The Business Advisory Committee authorized the Hon'ble Speaker to allot the time on the Bill. 4 Hrs were allotted in Rajya Sabha by the Business Advisory Committee for discussion along with the Farmers¹ (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020. Both Bills were taken up for discussion together. 44 members participated in the debate in Lok Sabha for 5 Hrs 36 minutes. In the Rajya Sabha, 33 Members participated in the debate and the Bills were discussed for 4 Hrs 14 Minutes. The Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Prices Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020 provides for a national framework for farming agreements that protects and empowers farmers to engage with agribusiness firms, processors, wholesalers, exporters, or large retailers for farm services and sale of future farming produce at a mutually agreed framework remunerative price fairly transparently. The Business Advisory Committee authorized the Hon'ble Speaker to allot the time on the Bill. 4 Hrs were allotted in Rajya Sabha by the Business Advisory Committee for discussion along with the Farmers' (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement of Price Assurance and Farm Services Bill, 2020.

Both Bills were taken up for discussion together. 44 members participated in the debate in Lok Sabha for 5 Hrs 36 minutes. In the Rajya Sabha, 33 Members participated in the debate and the Bills were discussed for 4 Hrs 14 Minutes. The Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 will boost immediate investment in the Agriculture sector, increase competition and enhance farmers' income. The Bill was allotted 2 Hrs in Lok Sabha and 3 Hrs in Rajya Sabha by the Business Advisory Committee respective discussion. 19 members participated in the debate in Lok Sabha and the Bill was discussed for 2 Hrs 23 minutes. In the Raiya Sabha, 6 Members participated in the debate and the Bill was discussed for 41 Minutes.

The Farm Laws Repeal Act, 2021 In view of protests by a group of farmers and to take everyone together on the path of inclusive growth and development in the 75th Year of India's Independence, the bill was introduced and passed to repeal the three farm laws namely, Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020, the Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020 the Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020 passed by Parliament in September 2020 with the objective of overall

development of farmers. The Bill was passed with discussion in Lok Sabha. In the Rajya Sabha 1 member participated in the debate and the Bill was discussed for 07 Minutes.

The Modi government has also taken brave steps towards empowering women through various legislative and policy measures. Under "Nari Shakti Abhiyan," the Modi government has championed the cause of women's development. Indira Gandhi's imposition of the Emergency in India from 1975 to 1977 is a dark chapter in the country's history, characterized by a severe assault on democracy and individual freedoms. marked Emergency the erosion democratic institutions. By suspending elections and dissolving legislative bodies, Indira Gandhi dismantled the essential pillars of democracy. Without a functioning parliament and state assemblies, there was no legislative oversight, removing the checks and balances crucial for a healthy democracy, civil liberties were severely suppressed. Fundamental rights such as freedom of speech, expression, and assembly were curtailed. The press faced heavy censorship, effectively silencing dissent and criticism against the government, a core tenet of any democratic society.

Arbitrary arrests and detentions were rampant. Thousands of political opponents, activists, and ordinary citizens were detained without trial under the Maintenance of Internal Security Act (MISA). These actions, often without due process, violated basic principles of justice and human rights. The misuse of presidential powers was evident when President Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed

declared the Emergency based on Indira Gandhi's advice, bypassing the Council of Ministers. This unilateral decision undermined the constitutional framework and set a dangerous precedent for future governance.

Judicial complicity during the Emergency, exemplified by the infamous ADM Jabalpur case, where the Supreme Court ruled that the right to life and liberty could be suspended, showcased the judiciary's failure to uphold constitutional rights and protect citizens from government overreach.

Media censorship further demonstrated the undemocratic nature of the Emergency. Newspapers and media outlets were forced to seek government approval before publishing, transforming the press into a government mouthpiece and stifling any form of dissent. Forced sterilizations under the government's family planning policies led to widespread human rights abuses. These coerced procedures, especially targeting the poor and marginalized, caused immense suffering and public outrage. Economic policies during the Emergency, such as crackdowns on black markets and enforcement of price controls, were draconian and poorly executed. These measures led to widespread public discontent and economic hardships for many citizens.

Political repression was a hallmark of the Emergency. Opposition leaders were jailed, political parties were banned, and state machinery was used to intimidate and silence opponents, starkly violating democratic norms. The Emergency also violated federal principles by centralizing power in the hands of the central government. State governments were dismissed or coerced into compliance, weakening the autonomy and authority of state administrations. Civil society organizations and NGOs faced severe restrictions. Many critical NGOs were harassed, their activities curtailed, and their members arrested, stifling civil society's role in promoting democracy and human rights.

Public disillusionment grew as the arbitrary arrests, censorship, and human rights abuses eroded trust in the government and democratic institutions. The period highlighted numerous legal and constitutional violations, with fundamental rights suspended and laws enacted without due legislative process.

International condemnation was swift, tarnishing India's image as the world's largest democracy and leading to diplomatic isolation and criticism from global leaders and human rights organizations. The legacy of the Emergency has had a lasting impact on future generations. It serves as a cautionary tale about the fragility of

democracy and the need for vigilance in protecting democratic institutions and civil liberties. Political pluralism suffered as opposition parties were targeted and suppressed. A healthy democracy thrives on diverse political voices and competition, both of which were stifled during the Emergency.

The bureaucracy, meant to be neutral, was coopted into executing the government's draconian measures. This led to a loss of trust in the civil service's ability to function impartially. Judicial reforms were delayed due to the judiciary's failure to protect fundamental rights during this period, highlighting the need for iudicial independence and ensurina accountability. Educational institutions faced strict controls over curricula and activities, stifling intellectual freedom critical and thought. Militarization of civil administration blurred the lines between civilian and military roles, leading to excessive force and human rights abuses.

The Emergency period undermined the spirit of the Indian Constitution, which enshrines democratic principles, individual freedoms, and the rule of law. Accountability mechanisms within the government were weakened. The lack of legislative oversight, judicial independence, and media freedom allowed unchecked executive power, leading to widespread abuse and corruption. The Emergency reshaped political alliances, leading to new political movements and fundamentally altering India's political landscape, affecting subsequent elections and governance.

Public administration was compromised as civil servants were pressured to conform government directives, often at the expense of ethical standards and public service principles. Grassroots movements and local activism faced repression, weakening severe grassroots democracy and local governance. Cultural and artistic expression was repressed, with artists, writers, and filmmakers who criticized the government facing censorship and harassment. Minority communities were particularly vulnerable. with authoritarian measures disproportionately affecting marginalized groups. Overall, the Emergency weakened democratic norms and principles. The arbitrary use of power, suspension of rights, and lack of accountability set dangerous precedents, threatening the democratic fabric of the nation.

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The Forced Imposition of Emergency



It has been five decades since the imposition of Internal Emergency in India by the Prime Minister Indira Gandhi. This period, spanning from June 1975 to March 21st, 1977, is often 25th, remembered as one of the darkest chapters in independent India's history. During the entire 21 months period, democracy was suspended, and over 100,000 citizens were arrested and detained without due cause or trial. Civil rights were suspended, and freedom of speech expression were severely curtailed. The imposition of Emergency was akin to the murder of democracy. Democracy thrives on the principles of transparency, accountability, and the rule of law. By suspending civil liberties, muzzling dissent, and centralizing power under her regime, Indira

Gandhi undermined these fundamental tenets of democracy. The suspension of habeas corpus meant that citizens could be detained without trial, depriving them of their basic right to due process. Freedom of speech and expression were stifled, with censorship imposed on the press and political opponents silenced through intimidation and imprisonment. Such actions infringed upon the rights of individuals and also eroded the very essence of democracy.

Many more faced intimidation and harassment from both police and extrajudicial actors acting interest. government's The infringement of civil liberties and human rights during the Emergency, wherein several individuals from various backgrounds were subjected to intimidation and torture merely for their ideological beliefs or perceived affiliations. Hon'ble Governor of Haryana, Shri Bandaru Dattatraya shared a tryst, quoting him, "In jail, I met people of different ideologies and even Naxalites, who had been arrested under the MISA. Former Union Ministers Bangaru Laxman, A Narendra, N Narasimha Reddy, former Labour Minister of Telangana, Mohammad Abdul Aziz, chief of Andhra Pradesh unit of Jamaat-e-Islami Hind, Cherabanda Raju and Varavara Rao were also in our jail. There were many others as well belonging to different ideologies and outfits

including Anand Marg but all united in protesting against the Emergency,".

"The police were not ready to give up in my case. They continued questioning and torturing me, disclosing my identity and sharing information about others. Police wanted to know: How many more friends were in my group? Where were their hideouts? Where is your printing press? What is the source of finances? What is your communication network? These were the questions the police were putting to me quite often. For three days, I did not share anything with them," Bandaru Dattatraya mentioned in his tryst.

"I used to wear kurta and pyjamas but had to go to pant, shirt, coat and tie. I did not go for any haircut. Being a full-time worker of the RSS, I was very particular about my dress code but adopted the western dress out of sheer compulsion. I changed my name to Dharmendra and went underground and kept mobilizing the people for agitation against the Emergency. That time all newspapers were censored and only government news was published. People were not able to know what was happening outside. So, we started a bulletin with facts and distributed them among the people secretly." he mentioned

The government heavily censored and controlled the national press, while also exerted substantial influence over foreign media outlets. The primary tool for enforcing this totalitarian control was information and communication technologies (ICTs), including radio, television, cinema, and public notices. With government ownership of radio and television, these platforms were utilized propagate the government's narrative efficiently. Other forms of media, such as cinema and popular music, were either restricted, coopted, or coerced into serving as instruments of government propaganda. The government leveraged these technologies to disseminate official propaganda, often accompanied by thinly veiled threats to ensure compliance. Dissent was swiftly suppressed, sometimes through violent means. New laws and amendments further augmented government control over the media, enabling surveillance, censorship, and the dissemination of government-approved viewpoints. By monopolizing radio waves, cinema, and telecommunication media, the government rapidly transformed a democratic state into a totalitarian regime.

The culmination of events leading to the declaration of the Emergency began on June 12, 1975, when the Allahabad High Court found Prime Minister Indira Gandhi guilty of electoral malpractices during the 1971 elections. In response, opposition parties and the media

her resignation. However, demanded Mrs. Gandhi appealed the verdict in the Supreme Court, which granted a conditional stay, allowing her to retain her position as Prime Minister but barring her from voting in Parliament until the case concluded. Following this ruling, Indira Gandhi and her close advisors swiftly devised plans to ensure her continued hold on power. On June 18, members of the Congress party pledged unwavering loyalty to Mrs. Gandhi's leadership, with party president D.K. Barooah famously proclaiming, "Indira is India and India is Indira," reminiscent of totalitarian declarations from history. Siddhartha Shankar Ray, a key member of Mrs. Gandhi's inner circle and Chief Minister of West Bengal, circulated detailed strategies for declaring an "Internal Emergency." Justification for this drastic measure cantered on alleged national threats to India's security destabilization efforts by external and internal adversaries. Lists were compiled identifying opposition leaders, union activists, and media personnel for potential arrest at short notice. Detailed plans for media censorship were meticulously crafted, with loyalists of Mrs. Gandhi's party and state chief ministers being summoned to meetings in New Delhi to inform them of forthcoming actions under the guise of national security. By June 25, arrangements for the mass arrests of political figures and others deemed as threats to stability were finalized, with final discussions taking place at Mrs. Gandhi's aide, R.K. Dhawan's office. On the night of June 25, Mrs. Gandhi, accompanied by Siddhartha Shankar Ray, met with President Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed and urged him to declare an "Internal Emergency," citing supposed threats to India's national security and stability. President Ahmed, who owed his position to Mrs. Gandhi's influence, consented and signed the proclamation of internal emergency under Article 352(1)2 of the Constitution around 11:45 PM, June 25, 1975.

This period witnessed a sharp deviation from democratic norms. The fundamental rights guaranteed by the Constitution were suspended, and existing laws were amended to consolidate control within a small circle loyal to Indira Gandhi, suppressing dissent. Media and communication technologies were exploited to perpetuate the Emergency, mirroring strategies utilized authoritarian regimes worldwide. The democratic had system, which operated successfully for more than 25 years, was eclipsed. India faced two unprecedented political crises: one marked by deterioration and another concerning democracy. The initial crisis was temporarily halted by the events that triggered the subsequent crisis focused on democratic values.

The scars left by the suspension of democracy ran deep, prompting a collective introspection on the fragility of democratic institutions and the importance of safeguarding civil liberties. Indira Gandhi's ruthless suspension of democracy was nothing short of a betrayal of the very ideals that the nation was built upon. The Indian populace suffered under the iron fist of a regime that cared little for human rights, civil liberties, or basic decency. Dissent was crushed, opposition silenced, and the voices of the people were drowned out by the roar of government propaganda. Under the quise of national security, Indira Gandhi and her cronies trampled over the Constitution, dismantled democratic institutions, and turned India into a totalitarian state. The arrest and torture of countless individuals, the suppression of free speech, and the manipulation of the media were all tactics employed to maintain an oppressive grip on power. Lives were destroyed, families torn apart, and the very soul of the nation was bruised and battered. The youth of India are eager to understand whether the imposition of the Emergency in 1975 was justified or not. To enlighten the younger generation, including college and university students, it is imperative to

organize seminars and conferences where individuals who experienced the effects of the Emergency can share their experiences and insights. These events will help raise awareness, much like the Center for Narendra Modi Studies. a think tank for global research that will host a national conclave on the 50th anniversary of the Dark Emergency in India on June 26, 2024 at India International Centre, New Delhi. Overall, Imposing emergency was not a noble act; rather, Indira Gandhi's motives were driven by selfinterest rather than the welfare of the nation. She prioritized her own power over the rights and freedoms of the Indian people. This entire period of Emergency is a dark stain in the history of India and every time reminding us of the dangers of erosion unchecked power and the democratic principles.

Yet he is Modi who made all the difference, courtesy to his charisma and political will with a noble vision. As he completes two decades of a non-stop stint as an able and longest serving administrator at the age of 74 today, his public life has already made a history which none of his predecessors could match as PM in their lifetime and which only resembles that of former US President Bill Clinton.

Since October 2001, when he was administered the oath of the office of the Chief Minister of Gujarat, he has been chairing an elected government for around 8380 days without any break which beats the record of the first PM Jawaharlal Nehru and his daughter Indira Gandhi who served as the head of a government for 6,130 days and 5829 days respectively. In comparison, Dr Manmohan Singh who was the immediate predecessor of Modi on consecutive terms during the UPA rule worked for 3656 days. Within the BJP, Modi has also been the most successful figure as a CM or PM. This has made him dependable, with a huge mass acceptability, to his party in any election anywhere as he has the experience of leading a state government and is blessed with the art of campaigning.

Riding on the crest of the Modi wave the BJP came to power at the Centre with a majority in 2014. It also ousted the Left from power in Tripura which was once considered a Red Bastion over three decades and grew significantly in other North Eastern states during the last seven years. Further, Modi has scored many firsts as the PM. At the Republic Day parade of 2015, he invited Barack Obama, the then US President as the chief guest before becoming the first Indian PM to visit Israel in July of 2017. He is the first PM who

From his ascent as the Chief Minister of Gujarat in 2001 to his current role as the nation's Prime Minister, Modi's tenure has been characterized by a series of far-reaching reforms and bold initiatives that have reshaped the trajectory of both Gujarat and India. His leadership has ushered in profound changes, most notably in the areas of economic reform, infrastructure development, and digital transformation.

Such initiatives, launched at the state level, became templates for broader national schemes when Modi assumed the office of Prime Minister in 2014. As Prime Minister, Modi has continued his reformist agenda on a national scale, embarking on ambitious projects to propel India forward in the digital age. His *Digital India* mission has expanded internet access across the country, makina India a global leader in transactions, most notably through the implementation of the Unified **Payments** Interface (UPI). In economic governance, one of the defining moments of Modi's tenure was the introduction of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) in 2017. This 'One Nation, One Tax' system sought to unify India's complex and fragmented tax structure,

facilitating smoother trade across states. While its implementation has been met with challenges, the GST stands as a landmark reform in India's economic history. Responding to the economic disruptions caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, launched the Atmanirbhar Bharat campaign in 2020, aiming for self-reliance and boosting domestic manufacturing. This was supported by the Production Linked Incentive (PLI) schemes, spanning 14 key sectors with investments worth Rs 1.97 lakh crore, designed to reduce import dependence and encourage domestic production. These measures have played a crucial role in India's economic resurgence, with the nation's GDP growing and foreign direct investment reachina unprecedented levels.

Modi's governance has also been characterized by his emphasis on Jan Bhagidari, or citizen participation in governance. His belief in involving citizens in the implementation of policies, thereby turning development into a Jan Andolan or mass movement, has been a hallmark of his approach. This participatory governance model has played an important role in ensuring that initiatives, whether in sanitation, water conservation, or public health, gain widespread public support and momentum. As history will record, Narendra Modi's 23 years in public office reflect a period of

transformative leadership. From his tenure as Gujarat's chief minister, where he laid the foundation for sweeping reforms, to his role as India's Prime Minister, Modi's vision has redefined governance in India. Modi's governance approach of "Vikas Bhi, Virasat Bhi" (Development along Heritage) aims to balance cultural preservation with modernization. Efforts like restoring the Kashi Vishwanath Corridor, building the Ram Mandir, and recovering over 640 artefacts for India reflect the administration's focus on these aspects. On the environmental side, initiatives such as Van Mahotsav and Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam have encouraged tree planting and conservation. The Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam campaign has resulted in the planting of 800 million saplings across the country. On the international stage, Modi introduced the Lifestyle for Environment (LiFE) movement at COP26, encouraging individuals and communities to adopt sustainable habits to combat climate change.

Modi's Jan Bhagidari (people's participation) approach is a consistent theme in his initiatives, and over the past decade as Prime Minister, he has coined several motivational slogans to inspire citizens. Modi's governance reforms included scrapping more than 1,200 outdated laws and reducing 39,000 compliances to simplify administration. Some of his earliest slogans were "Swachh Bharat" (Clean India) and "Beti Bachao, Beti Padhao" (Save the girl child, educate the girl child). Currently, Modi emphasizes the slogan "Viksit Bharat" (Developed India), outlining his vision for the nation's future with long-term development goals and a stronger global presence which he hopes India will attain the status of a developed nation by 2047.

It was the 74th Independence Day on August 15, 2020, when Prime Minister Narendra Modi, from the ramparts of the Red Fort, introduced an initiative to establish the National Research Foundation (NRF). This was part of his broader vision for India's development, with the NRF intended to boost scientific research and innovation across the country. The origins of the NRF can be traced back to the growing that recognition India's higher education institutions and research output, significant, lag behind global standards. The

need for a coordinated body to support and manage research funding became evident as India aspired to boost its global standing in science and technology.

The Union Cabinet, chaired by the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, approved the introduction of the National Research Foundation (NRF) Bill, 2023 in the Parliament on 28th June. The bill outlined the establishment of the NRF under the Department of Science and Technology (DST) and proposed a five-year budget of Rs. 50,000 crore to support research activities across various fields.

The NRF Act, passed in August 2023, established the foundation as the apex body for research in India. With the Prime Minister of India serving as its President, the NRF enjoys the highest level of leadership and oversight. A Governing Board, comprising prominent scientists, researchers, and

industry leaders, was set up to guide the foundation's activities, review projects, and allocate funding.

The key aim of Anusandhan National research foundation is to provide high-level strategic directions for research. innovation. entrepreneurship in the fields of natural sciences, including mathematical sciences, engineering and technology, environmental and earth sciences, health and agriculture, and scientific and technological interfaces of humanities and social sciences. In the past, Indian research efforts have often been siloed, with limited interaction between academia and the private sector. The NRF seeks to promote an environment where research and innovation can thrive.

Collaboration between institutions will also ensure that have research projects practical applications that benefit society at large. The NRF is designed to be inclusive. It aims to support research across Tier 2 and Tier 3 institutions, which often struggle to access funding and resources. This decentralized approach ensures researchers in smaller universities and colleges are given equal opportunities to contribute to national projects. The NRF is to enhance research infrastructure in India. This includes providing funding for laboratories, research equipment, and state-of-the-art facilities that can support

high-quality research. Many Indian institutions have faced challenges due to outdated infrastructure, limiting their ability to conduct world-class research.

India has a rich history of scientific achievements, from ancient contributions to mathematics and astronomy to modern advancements in space exploration and information technology. The NRF seeks to build on this legacy by providing a structured and well-funded platform researchers. The foundation will help attract the best minds to research careers, offering them the support and resources they need to pursue innovative projects. The foundation aims to build a strong pipeline of researchers, innovators, and scientists. This includes providing mentorship and guidance to young researchers, as well as offering funding for scholarships and research fellowships.

The Anusandhan National Research Foundation (ANRF) represents India's efforts to advance research and innovation to reach global standards in science and technology. Its key objectives include creating a roadmap for research that focuses on the short, medium, and long term. The foundation supports academic and research institutions, particularly universities and colleges that are still developing their research capacities. It achieves this through

funding, fellowships, research projects, and creating centers of excellence. ANRF also aims to support and fund research proposals that undergo a competitive peer-review process. It helps institutions build research infrastructure with a focus on national priorities, strategic areas, and emerging technologies. One of its goals is to increase India's presence in important global research areas and to assist in converting research into large-scale technologies.

The foundation coordinates national programs to address social, financial, and technological challenges. It works with the government, industry, and other institutions to track research spending and results and report these to the Additionally, government. **ANRF** promotes international collaborations and the exchange of scientific knowledge. It encourages partnerships with Indian and foreign scientists and promotes investments from public and private sectors to strengthen India's scientific ecosystem. It also maintains a national survey to track the progress and outcomes of research.

The schemes introduced by the Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB) include Intensification of Research in High Priority Areas (IRHPA), Core Research Grant, Start-up Research Grant (SRG), Scientific and Useful Profound Research Advancement (SUPRA), Empowerment

and Equity Opportunities for Excellence in Science, Mathematical Research Impact Centric Support (MATRICS), Impacting Research Innovation and Technology (IMPRINT-2), International Travel Support, Seminar Symposia, Short-term special call on COVID-19, SERB-POWER Grant, State University Research Excellence (SERB-SURE) and Fund for Industrial Research Management (SERB-FIRE).

The awards and fellowships offered by the Science and Engineering Research Board (SERB) include the National Post Doctoral Fellowship, J.C. India's own commitment to net-zero emissions dovetails strongly with and adds to the efforts of Saudi Arabia in sustainability and environmental responsibility. In geopolitical terms, further strengthening of India-Saudi Arabia ties becomes a positive message to the entire landscape of the West Asian region, demonstrating how economic cooperation could translate into peace,

prosperity, and mutual development in the region itself.

This visit will also give rise to cultural exchanges in arts, literature, cinema, and heritage conservation projects, thereby nurturing better understanding and appreciation of each other's civilizations. The other potential would be in conveying to the Indian business community the message of vast potential existing within Gulf markets.

Mega projects of Saudi Arabia, like NEOM, offer opportunities in construction, IT, consultancy, and engineering services to Indian firms. Mega strategic connectivity corridors: India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEEC)—India stands to gain significantly from such corridors. Saudi Arabia is a crucial link to realize the grand vision of integrated economic growth in trade and so on.

This visit of Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi is very much future-shaping diplomacy. It is the celebration of shared visions, mutual aspirations, and pursuit towards global progress by bilateral synergy.

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Women's Empowerment in Waqf Governance



Waqf has been very important to society for generations. The concept of Waqf in Islam is the dedication of properties, income, or assets used for worship or charity purposes. These assets generate income that is utilized to do works such as build schools and hospitals, mosques, and provide food and shelter to the disadvantaged. This concept has always been a strong pillar of support to poor and needy communities.

Stacks of this waqf have helped many; Muslim women, in fact, have left out with lots of opportunities unattended and no benefits associated with waqf behind them. Limited participation in the management of waqf and an inadequate resource access were largely

responsible for this inequality, which existed long into history and needed urgent reform. Change of this wretched state was brought about by the Waqf (Amendment) Act, 2025 introduced by the government.

This law aims to increase Waqf's inclusiveness, especially for Muslim women. Many of the new regulations give women their rightful share of property, financial support, and a voice in Waqf affairs. This is a major step forward in the struggle for gender equality in Islamic charity. The most welcome change in the new enactment is the conserving of women inheritance in a special category of Waqf known as Waqf-alal-aulad. This type of Waqf is mostly created for children and descendants' benefit by the families, but sometimes families would use it to deprive the daughters of their property share by dedicating everything in Waqf.

To curb this misuse, the Act ensures that no property goes into Waqf unless all female heirs are given their entitlement. This provision, found in Section 3A(2), requires that daughters, widows, and mothers receive their share before any property can enter the Waqf. This step delivers justice since Islam clearly gives fixed shares to women in inheritance and stops the family from misusing the Waqf setup for avoiding property for women. From now, every woman will be given

her share, before a property is converted into Waqf.

Additionally, the new law extends the scope of Waqf-alal-aulad; hitherto, such a Waqf was employed only on behalf of males. Under Section 3(r) (iv), however, it can also be utilized to benefit orphans, widows, and divorced women. This change has tremendous possibilities as it now tends to offer a safety net to women who face the exigencies of life. After the husband's death, widows face numerous hardships, often with one or no income or support source. Divorced women and orphans are also subject to economic ambivalence. Not directly neglected by this law, they will be able to draw advantages from Waqf towards meeting their basic needs, education, health, and shelter.

This arrangement stands in line with Islamic principles of justice, mercy, and concern for the weak and needy. The society turns into a more equal, caring society by utilizing Waqf money for their benefit, and the Waqf system becomes a true instrument of social good. Another major reform in the Act is the inclusion of women in Waqf governance. It has now become compulsory that each State Waqf Board and the Central Waqf Council have at least two Muslim

women as members, as stated in Sections 14 and 9 respectively.

Women were formerly kept out of decision-making processes regarding Waqf, with men traditionally making the decisions. Thus women's thoughts and concerns were often bypassed. With more women in their rightful leadership positions today, women's needs and welfare will likely receive better representation. In deciding the expenditure of Waqf funds and the projects to be supported, women, too, will participate.

The inclusion of women in decision-making is therefore not simply symbolic; there are real transformations. Women leaders can see to it that Waaf funds are put to very noble causes, such as educating girls, maternity care, legal aid, vocational trainina, and microfinance women. The presence of women in leadership positions would be an inspiration for other women to come out and become engaged in social and religious issues with confidence, owning the resources that belong to the community. This is an important step toward achieving aendersensitive governance.

The Act is bent toward promoting Waqf funds for providing scholarships and education to Muslim girls. Education is the strongest weapon of empowerment. When girls are educated, they

become independent, confident, and capable of making choices for themselves and their families. Waqf can be a strong source of financing for their dreams.

Apart from education, the law supports healthcare for women in the area of maternity support. Many Muslim women, particularly in the lower strata of society, are deprived of quality medical care. But today, using Waqf money for their benefit, they can get treated, take medicine via medical assistance, and get support during pregnancy and childbirth.

The new law also promotes women to learn skill training and engage in entrepreneurship. Waqf money could also be utilized to set up vocational training centers where women could learn skills like tailoring, beauty services, computer operations, healthcare, or business management.

These skills will get them jobs or help them start small businesses. Waqf will also support micro financing and self-help groups (SHGs) so that women can take small loans and either run shops or offer services to make a living. The money helps them earn some independence and get financially empowered.

The law also allows the use of the Waqf Fund for legal aid relevant to inheritance rights and domestic violence. Many women are unaware of their legal rights or are unable to procure legal assistance. Waqf shall now extend help to them so that they might find justice and protection.

Among the most significant reforms in the Act is the computerization of Waqf records. Waqf properties and transactions are stored and maintained in a computer system all over the country. This digital database will enhance transparency and check corruption.

There had been many instances of Waqf fund misappropriation or illegal takeover of properties. Tracking of funds and properties would be simplified through digital records, allowing the fulfilling of the rights of intended beneficiaries for legitimate uses. This comes in handy for women, who are now able to possess records for proving certain properties for their own benefits. Digital documents will also clear the air.

Women can find out online which Waqf scheme is working for education, health, or assistance-and how to access it. This ultimately brings greater transparency, efficiency, and fairness into the whole system. The Act also advocates the redress of past injustices in which women were excluded from the benefits of Waqf. It, therefore,

sets the scene for an equal society by recognizing the wrongs and equipping women with equal rights in decision-making and economic support.

The Act is in keeping with the values of the Indian Constitution, which confers equality and justice to all peoples, and the genuine teachings of Islam, wherein women's rights are respected and protected. The essence of both laws is reflected therein. Waqf women's empowerment is not limited to mere assistance; it involves friendliness, dignity, and leadership. It is through this law that women will be made real partners in the Waqf system, which moves them into public view from the margins of community life.

The reforms are then to produce a fully just and inclusive Waqf system working together for the benefit of society for both men and women. A more responsible and just leadership will evolve for the management of religious and charitable resources in the long run. Thereupon, in the hands of these initiatives, Waqf will become an obligation which is not only religiously obligatory but also a modern and effective tool for social welfare, empowerment, and development. It will set a precedent on how to invest community resources in uplifting the weakest sections, especially women and children.

An awareness-building initiative needs to be initiated at this place to develop women's understanding of their rights under Waaf. And this is where NGOs, schools, and religious leaders come in by championing the message that women find a rightful share and also a voice in Wagf. They should also start preparing training programs for women members of Waaf Boards and SHGs to strengthen their leadership, knowledge of laws, and financial skills. They serve as empowered women to bring a change revolutionizina their families own and communities.

The Waqf (Amendment) Act, 2025, sends strong signals that the government is serious about women development and fairness of religion. This is a good model of how a law can be made to bring about social justice. True empowerment takes place when law, faith, and gender rights come together. It pays complete transformation in Waqf administration because this Act is now securing inheritance rights, providing service to widows and divorced women, upholding economic freedom, and involving women in decision-making.

It is a bold and historic commitment to gender justice in India. In the near future, we hope that many more women will be seen fashioning the destiny of Waqf, steering its resources towards their most effective deployment, and making it into an immensely powerful force for equality and progress within the community.

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From Crisis to Consensus: India's Global Mission after Pahalgam



In the wake of the tragic Pahalgam terrorist attack, India demonstrated a near-perfect representation of strategic diplomacy, antiterrorist coherence, and global engagement. The state machinery refrained from acting out of reflexive aggression or preceding emotional rhetoric and chose instead to pursue measured diplomacy with multiple stakeholders, wherein moral vigor was allied with factual accuracy. Such high-mindedness and virtue bespeak the maturity of a dignified Republic that sees cooperation, rather than isolation, as being the most powerful force multiplier against terrorism.

The most notable post-event reactions of India is the swift activation of parliamentary diplomacy. Dispatching seven multi-party delegations to 33 nations was a statement of intention and a reflection of the Indian style of inclusive foreign policy. This broke any opposition attempt at portraying the nation as divided. Such seldom-seen unity in foreign matters placed before the world the fact that in matters of national security, India speaks with one voice.

With this initiative, India ensured that the Pahalgam attack would not be treated as a mere internal matter of India but as a serious turning point in the international fight against cross-border terrorism. India completely recast the discourse away from the narrow prism of Kashmir to encompass international law, human rights, and religious sanctity.

What made the Indian approach different was that it stood for the moral high ground without showing any apparent weakness. In choosing to go the diplomatic route rather than retaliate at once, the Indian government pre-empted any appearances of weakness, thus its strength. It was the mark of a Regional Power with responsibility. This was not passivity but aiming in the long term to isolate the menace of terrorism diplomatically, economically, and morally in global affairs.

India's emphasis on involving Islamic countries like Iran, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, and Bahrain was especially shrewd. This sensitive positioning

enabled the government to state unequivocally that Islam and terror could be differentiated, a message that struck a deep chord in the Muslim world and yielded India precious diplomatic capital in the Gulf and elsewhere.

As significant was the Indian government's move to reach out to the Taliban regime in Afghanistan. Ideologically far apart, Taliban's public denunciation of the attack, reportedly as a reaction to India's overtures, was a moment of pragmatism. This overture served to strengthen the perception that India can approach all parties in the neighborhood when national interest requires it, without letting its values or principles come in the way.

India's Foreign Service, usually underreported in the popular narrative, should be especially complimented on doing its painstaking spadework. The nicety with which facts, victim statements, and strategic briefs were put before capitals as diverse as Tokyo and Berlin, Nairobi and Buenos Aires, says much of institutional synergy. It was not just a demonstration of anguish but an extension of intent.

One of the most significant components of this initiative was the dispatch of seven all-party parliamentary delegations to 25 nations across the world. These delegations were carefully composed to reflect the inclusiveness of Indian

democracy, with MPs from various political parties representing the country in key global capitals.

Congress MP Shashi Tharoor led the delegation to the United States, emphasizing that their mission was not partisan but national—built on the consensus that terrorism is a shared global threat. Kanimozhi Karunanidhi of the DMK spearheaded the delegation to Russia, where discussions revolved around strengthening counter-terrorism cooperation. KC Venugopal, also of the Congress, was part of the Public Accounts Committee already stationed in Kashmir at the time of the attack and provided immediate oversight on local developments.

The outreach also included a five-member Trinamool Congress delegation comprising Derek O'Brien, Md Nadimul Haque, Sagarika Ghose, Mamata Thakur, and senior minister Manas Bhuniya, who visited conflict-hit zones in Jammu & Kashmir to gather firsthand insights. This multiparty presence reinforced the perception of political maturity and bipartisan unity in India's foreign policy response.

These dignitaries not only articulated India's strategic concerns but humanized the national sentiment, lending a moral and democratic weight to the campaign. Their active participation in international forums helped shift

the global perception of the Pahalgam attack from a regional skirmish to a pressing concern within the broader global fight against terrorism.

AlMIM MP Asaduddin Owaisi was also part of the all-party delegation that visited Bahrain. During the visit, Owaisi emphasized national unity by setting aside political differences to affirm India's sovereignty and integrity. He condemned Pakistan, labeling it a "failed state," and highlighted that the threat India has been facing for years emanates from Pakistan.

Owaisi called on Pakistan to end justifications for terrorism, dismantle terror networks, and take responsibility for cross-border terrorism. His participation underscored the unified front among Indian political representatives abroad, underlining the importance of national solidarity in international forums.

The coordinated all-party parliamentary delegations under Operation Sindoor sent a strong and unified diplomatic signal to the international community, reshaping the global narrative around the Pahalgam terrorist attack. involving leaders across the political spectrum—including the Congress, DMK, TMC, AIMIM. and others—India effectively demonstrated that its stance against terrorism transcends domestic politics. This bipartisan unity added significant credibility to India's appeals abroad, especially in countries where public opinion and policy are influenced by perceptions of internal political consensus.

When voices like Shashi Tharoor, Kanimozhi, and Asaduddin Owaisi stood shoulder to shoulder to call out Pakistan's role in harboring terrorism, it made it difficult for any nation to dismiss India's claims as politically motivated. The presence of opposition leaders added moral and democratic weight to India's case, making it resonate more powerfully with foreign governments, media, and civil society organizations.

These delegations also disrupted Pakistan's long-standing tactic of portraying the Kashmir issue as a matter of local unrest or human rights violations. The Indian MPs not only highlighted the external nature of the terrorist threat but also emphasized the broader global risks posed by Pakistan-sponsored extremism. This shifted the framing of the issue from a bilateral or regional conflict to a matter of international concern.

Moreover, the outreach helped India build stronger counter-terror alliances and gain support for its position in multilateral forums like the UN and the FATF. Countries that were earlier neutral or hesitant began acknowledging the legitimacy of India's concerns, leading to diplomatic pressure on Pakistan to act against terrorist groups operating from its soil. The overall

outcome was a clear diplomatic win for India, achieved not just through government channels but through democratic, inclusive, and strategic diplomacy.

For decades, India had often waited for the global community to acknowledge its concerns on cross-border terrorism. This time, India took the narrative abroad—crafting it, owning it, and steering it toward actionable outcomes. This narrative leadership, especially in multilateral fora, is a sign of India's emergence as a normative power.

A defining success of India's campaign was the manner in which it drew a clear line between democratic pluralism and terror-driven autocracy. In meetings with lawmakers in Europe and North America, Indian MPs underscored the challenges faced by the world's largest democracy in upholding human rights amid existential security threats.

This juxtaposition highlighted India's civilizational values and its commitment to preserving them despite provocations. India's emphasis on international legal norms—particularly UN resolutions against terror financing and human rights conventions—was both timely and intelligent. It reminded the world that India's position was grounded not just in national sentiment, but in international law. This legal

framing resonated well in Western capitals where policymaking is increasingly driven by rules-based considerations.

The outreach also offered India an opportunity to question the global double standards on terrorism. For far too long, certain powers have maintained ambiguous postures on terror emanating from Pakistan. By presenting a structured narrative backed by evidence, India subtly challenged the selective morality of the global system. It asked a pressing question: can terrorism be condemned in one geography and tolerated in another?

India's campaign also drew strength from its diaspora. Indian-origin parliamentarians, business leaders, and academics in countries like the US, UK, Canada, and Australia amplified New Delhi's message through local media and public forums. This networked diplomacy added both cultural legitimacy and political reach to the government's efforts, demonstrating the soft power depth of the Indian state.

Importantly, India resisted the temptation to securitize its domestic spaces in reaction to the attack. There were no sweeping arrests, no media trials, and no communal finger-pointing. This measured internal conduct, in stark contrast to global examples of state overreach post-terror incidents, enhanced India's democratic

credentials and made its external messaging even more credible.

It would be remiss not to note the role of Prime Minister Modi's leadership in navigating the post-Pahalgam terrain. His decision to let institutional mechanisms, rather than political speeches, shape the response showed a rare blend of restraint and resolve. This decentralization of narrative control allowed India's message to come through as more inclusive, less partisan, and therefore more persuasive globally.

India's response has potentially reshaped the global discourse on Kashmir-related terrorism. No longer can it be dismissed as a bilateral or regional dispute. The Pahalgam attack, and India's strategic internationalization of its consequences, forces the world to reckon with the broader implications of inaction in the face of state-sponsored radicalism.

The coordinated participation of Indian think tanks and research institutions in the diplomatic campaign added intellectual gravitas. Policy papers, briefings, and analytical reports complemented the emotional and moral dimensions of India's message. This coupling of intellect and emotion gave India a multi-layered diplomatic arsenal.

India's ability to speak in the language of the world—democracy, law, development, human rights—was vital to the success of its campaign. No longer is Indian diplomacy reactive or moralistic alone. It is now outcome-oriented, narrative-savvy, and evidence-driven—traits that are essential for global leadership in the 21st century.

In regions like Africa and Latin America, Indian MPs found unexpected support. Many leaders in these regions see India as a kindred spirit—a post-colonial democracy balancing growth, diversity, and security.

The most enduring impact of India's campaign is the normalization of parliamentary diplomacy. By allowing elected MPs to carry the flag of foreign policy, the government democratized international engagement. This model has the potential to outlast the current administration and evolve into a foundational pillar of Indian diplomacy.

Lastly, India's response to the Pahalgam attack has set a template for future crises. It reflects a matured nation-state that neither bends under threat nor explodes in fury. It dialogues, it documents, and it drives consensus. In the battle between the pen and the gun, India once again chose the former—and won global respect.

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New Momentum for Nari Shakti: 11 Years of Women Empowerment under Modi Government



For generations, the societal norms established many discriminatory standards to oppress women, and especially those who lived in rural, impoverished conditions, with no access to quality education, decent health, work opportunities, and political voice. Subtle and not-so-subtle gender discrimination was routinely embedded in both mindset and institution. But since 2014, India has shifted paradigms regarding the perspective of women, and the role of women in India.

Under Prime Minister Narendra Modi, women were no longer viewed as passive victims of aid – they were no longer collateral to the development agenda – they represented the opposite of collateral, they were the pivot point. "Nari Shakti" became not only a slogan, but also a national campaign. Not only is the role of women in India's economy growing – in real tangible and measurable terms – it is being celebrated all over India as they transition from roles in their homes to the highest offices of power.

Maybe some of the most significant change was in the form of lifecycle approach. Instead of one intervention or one development process – empowerment was now portrayed as a journey. The journey begins at birth and the support of women development all the way through to the final moments of life's journey. Mindset around empowerment meant that women were provided support throughout their transitional life, irrespective of life, personal, or professional ambitions.

The government initiated these changes with constitutional norms and legal reform, first creating constitutional safeguards, and strengthening laws and mechanisms for implementation, to protect against violence and discrimination. As a result, there were laws to

protect women and girls from violence and discrimination. At the same time, initiatives such as 'Beti Bachao Beti Padhao' were launched to create awareness, action, and celebration of the girl child, and to safeguard her rights, especially in districts where the child sex ratio is lower.

Education was another key focus area. For example, government programs continued to invest in separate sanitation facilities in schools as part of the 'Swachh Vidyalaya Abhiyan' to help young girls continue getting an education with dignity. The sanitation facilities contributed towards creating a better environment, which had a positive impact on retention in schools and was likely the start of building a foundation for the future.

The fundamental need towards the finances of young girls was addressed through the 'Sukanya Samriddhi Yojana'. With over Rs 3 lakh crore of savings in over 4.2 crore accounts, families that opened an account were given a commitment for their daughter; beyond that, it gave families an additional reason to save money and realize their daughter's potential both economically and emotionally. This too helped change mindsets at the family and community level as it was built around value.

Women's participation in economic activities also had exponential growth. The MUDRA Yojana was

established which enabled millions of women to be business owners and start their own business. Women represented almost68% of beneficiaries. This demonstrated that women can not only exist in the job market from an employment perspective, but when given access, women can be successful entrepreneurs and job creators within their community.

The opening up of defence forces for women brought a revolutionary change in national perspective towards women's roles. Girls got entry to Sainik Schools. Women got a permanent commission in the Forces. This dismantled old prejudices and enabled young girls to think of aspiring to careers which had seemed out of reach. A second area of empowerment was women in the family. Under PM Awas Yojana, 73% of the houses have been registered in the names of women solely or jointly. This gave women legal ownership, but also increased their confidence and respect in the family.

In health and nutrition, Mission POSHAN 2.0 was particularly tailored towards children, adolescent girls, pregnant women and lactating mothers. A total of more than Rs 1.81 lakh crore was invested by the Government of India to empower the nutrition ecosystem modernly and through the community. Under the Mission we integrated early education with nutrition aiming for children

under six through Poshan Bhi Padhai Bhi, establishing assured nutrition as well as early education through upgraded Anganwadi centres. This framed early childhood care and education as preparation for long term learning outcomes.

As part of the 15th Finance Commission cycle, the government committed to modernizing 2 lakh Anganwadi Centres. More than 24,500 have been transformed into new Saksham Anganwadis by 2025. These Anganwadis are not merely nutrition centres but, rather, community engagement and knowledge generating centres.

The Poshan Tracker – a digital monitoring solution –Scored the Award for being innovative and efficient in providing public service. It provides 24/7 monitoring and service delivery or Aadhaar authentic verification including biometric and facial verification for transparency in understanding service delivery of Take-Home Ration. The tracker has been recognised as a global digital transformation governance model for maternal and child welfare.

Nutrition at the local level has seen additional support through the Suposhit Gram Panchayat Abhiyaan which was launched in December 2024. This campaign rewards villages that are eligible as being top performing villages

demonstrating significant change in improvement in community nutrition that demonstrates leadership locally, Leadership in National Development.

Another flagship program is the Universal Immunization Programme (UIP), which each year immunizes almost 2.9 crore pregnant women. These mothers receive lifesaving vaccines and their newborns get immunized preventing disease and death, which has been a key intervention to reduce maternal and under-5 mortality.

The Janani Shishu Suraksha Karyakram (JSSK) has saved money for mothers by covering their antenatal and postnatal care including the crucial first 48-hours of life. Since being scaled up in 2014, over 16.6 crore women and children have accessed these services. To strengthen the JSSK, the Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY) provided cash transfers conditional upon facility births (or institutional deliveries) for mothers.

To date, over 11 crore women have been covered under the programme, particularly in rural areas where they had no access to safe delivery solutions, making delivery safer for mothers and babies. To maintain respectful and quality care at a local level, the 'Surakshit Matritva Aashwasan' (SUMAN) scheme aimed to provide zero-financial healthcare costs mothers and newborns, ensuring they receive care where

they live. As of March 2025, over 90,000 certified health facilities were providing these services to mothers and newborns, showing confidence in public healthcare systems, which is a good outcome.

The 'Pradhan Mantri Surakshit Matritva Abhiyan' (PMSMA) provides women with antenatal checkdurina their early pregnancy. complications can be detected and treated making the scheme a very effective intervention to save women's lives, lowering maternal mortality rates, and enhancing women's knowledge around their own bodies. The scheme continues to drive evidence of women's rights to get access to healthcare and follow up care in their own right.

'Pradhan Mantri Matru Vandana Yojana' (PMMVY) cash transfers were made directly to pregnant and lactating mothers to provide for an adequate diet and health care in pregnancy and to improve health and nutrition practices in early motherhood when development and nutrition are critical. PMMVY will reduce financial stress and could lead to changes in behaviors and practices among moms.

Menstrual hygiene has been neglected for too long and over 77 crore sanitary pads were made available at a meager Rs 1 through Jan Aushadhi Kendras, thereby making sanitary health a right for every woman as sanitary products were made affordable and available to rural and semi-urban women. Access to safe tap water connections through the Jal Jeevan Mission benefitted over 15 crore households. This not only benefitted women by lightening the load of securing water, but it also improved hygiene and improved health outcomes by reducing water-borne diseases and reduced time poverty.

More than just policies and programs, an important transformation has occurred with the prevailing mindset. Today, women are not regarded as dependents but leaders. They participate in self-help groups, cooperatives, and local governing communities, and even parliament through landmark practices such as the 'Nari Shakti Vandan Adhiniyam', which reserved 33% of seats for women in our legislative process.

When you examine the fields of STEM, civil services, sports, defence, and aviation, Indian women are rising to the top; they are leading missions to Mars, flying fighter jets, and SHG women who starting businesses. All this is contributing to a silent revolution that is now loud and proud! 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PM Narendra Modi's International Recognition: What It Means for India's Future



Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi was recently given The Grand Collar of the National Order of the Southern Cross by Brazil. This is the highest award Brazil gives to a foreign leader. It shows the deep friendship between India and Brazil, and the growing respect for PM Modi across the world. Such awards are a way of honouring all 140 crore Indians. They show that the world is noticing India's progress. Under PM Modi's leadership, India is seen as strong, trusted, and ready to help others. From big countries to small nations, many are thanking India for its support and friendship. These awards tell the story of a leader who speaks with honesty and works for the

good of the people. Around the same time, In July 2025, another chapter was added to the remarkable diplomatic journey of Prime Minister Narendra Modi when he was conferred with The Order of the Republic of Trinidad & Tobago, the highest civilian award of the Caribbean nation. This honour, like many before was a tribute to the 140 crore Indians whose collective aspirations are being recognized on the world stage through PM Modi's leadership. From the islands of the Pacific to the coasts of the Caribbean, the message is consistent: India is no longer viewed in silos of geography. In June 2025, Prime Minister Narendra Modi was conferred the Grand Cross of the Order of Makarios III, the highest civilian honour of Cyprus. The conferment of this rare civilian honour was sent as a global signal that Indian leadership can no longer be seen as only regional, but is being taken seriously across continents. For a tiny European nation, the honour implies a big-scale respect for the increasing spirit of India in world affairs.PM Modi dedicated the award to all 1.4 billion citizens of India. The awards he receives abroad are often the world's way of acknowledging the silent transformation occurring inside India: a people gaining pride, a voice, and global recognition. Just weeks earlier, in April 2025, Sri Lanka had conferred upon him the Sri Lanka Mitra Vibhushana, its highest honour to a foreign head

of state. Faced with numerous economic and political crises, Sri Lanka was equally thankful to India for its timely support under PM Narendra Modi's leadership. It was a diplomatic thank-you; an acknowledgment of India as a reliable neighbour and partner in times of need.

In March 2025, Prime Minister Narendra Modi was awarded the Order of the Star and Key of the Indian Ocean by Mauritius, another close partner. The small island nation recognised India's support in trade, infrastructure, and pandemic response. PM Modi's global diplomacy often goes beyond big summits-it touches smaller nations through consistent help, engagement, and respect. The Mubarak Al-Kabeer Order of Kuwait was presented to PM Modi in December 2024, making it the highest civilian honor of Kuwait. This was awarded after more than 40 years had gone by since an Indian Prime Minister had visited Kuwait, hence symbolising friendship based on the energy sector, cultural interaction, and shared welfare of overseas Indians in Kuwait. A similar bundle of awards came in the same year from the four countries of Guyana, Dominica, Nigeria, and Barbados, all conferred in a single month. These countries see PM Modi as a conscionable voice of the Global South, one who speaks not only for India but also for those countries that almost never come into the purview of international discussions. The Order of Excellence; Dominica Award of Honour; Grand Commander of the Order of the Niger; and Honorary Order of Freedom-each carried a different symbol of meaning.

In July 2024, Russia bestowed upon PM Modi their highest civilian honour-the Order of St. Andrew. Russia giving this award to PM Modi in the current geopolitical climate is a mark of India being seen, under PM Narendra Modi's leadership, as a balanced and strategic actor. It must be very difficult to act with equanimity, maintaining good relations with all major powers without taking sides. Further still, in March 2024, Bhutan presented PM Modi with the Order of the Druk Gyalpo. The conferral was a first; never before had Bhutan bestowed its highest civilian honour upon a foreign head of state. This speaks of personal warmth and trust, of intertwined cultural histories that India, under PM Modi's stewardship, has worked hard to nurture. In 2023, PM Modi received the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour from France and the Order of Honour from Greece. These recognitions signified admiration for PM Modi's global leadership, India's expanding technological and defence partnerships, and common democratic ideals. It was both poetic and powerful that the Greek Award came to India as a democratic country.

In the same year, Egypt awarded him the Order of the Nile-this underlined PM Modi's outreach

and also highlighted India's increasing role in the Arab world. Aimed Africa and strenathening ties between Cairo and Delhi through gestures grounded in history blended with optimism, this recognition embraced new beginnings while honouring age-old connections. Papua New Guinea and Fiji joined other nations recognizing PM Modi's contributions by awarding him their highest distinctions in 2023. To many onlookers, these island countries go unnoticed on the political landscape alongside overshadowed by major powers. However, they viewed PM Modis COVID medical assistance as a muchneeded kind gesture during troubling times. Their awards underscored an everlasting gratitude.

What is incredible about this long roster of honours is that they are so diverse. From world powers such as France and Russia to tiny island nations, from democracies to monarchies, from Asia to Africa to Europe to the Pacific—its leaders are rewarding PM Modi. This has nothing to do with the policy of one country. It has to do with one leader's consistency and overtures. Symbols are important in diplomacy. These awards, though symbolic, are political. They are about the confidence reposed in PM Modi-not only by citizens at home, but by countries overseas. That confidence is the product of years of consistent interaction, transparent communication, and sound decision-making. PM Modi's diplomacy

does not always follow tradition. He reaches out directly, uses soft power like yoga and Ayurveda, and speaks in the language of friendship and self-reliance. He believes India doesn't have to choose between East or West-it can walk with both. And the world seems to appreciate this flexible, firm approach. Outside of governments, PM Modi has also been recognized by international institutions. The United Nations awarded him the Champions of the Earth Award in 2018 for leadership in the environment. That same year, he received the Seoul Peace Prize, which commended his economic reforms and poverty alleviation.

The Philip Presidential Kotler Award acknowledged PM Modi's ability to shape global perception. Whether one agrees or not, it is clear that under PM Modi, India has become a stronger brand. The Global Goalkeeper Award by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation praised the success of the Swachh Bharat Mission, a program that went beyond building toilets—it restored dignity to millions. These accolades don't simply demonstrate what PM Modi has achieved overseas—they reflect what he has transformed domestically. Cleanliness, economic changes, digitalization, and India's emergence as a healthcare provider during the pandemic all have been the focus of international attention. In a time when global conflicts are rising, the

ability to create trust across borders is a rare gift. PM Modi's awards reflect that trust. Another aspect that is distinctive is that no previous Indian prime minister has been conferred this number of international civilian awards.PM Narendra Modi created a new image of Indian leadership across the world. These awards are billboards along the highway. They indicate how far India has travelled, and in which direction. Ultimately, these international awards are a tribute to India itself. They are a testament to how the world perceives India—respected, powerful, and reliable. Through PM Modi, the world is cheering a billion aspirations unfolding. And that cheering, earned with action and presence, is what makes these awards so much more significant.

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From Red Fort to Real Change under PM Modi's Leadership



Every Independence Day carries emotion, but this year's 79th Independence Day felt especially powerful. Prime Minister Narendra Modi's speech from the Red Fort was filled with pride in India's journey, concern for the challenges we face, and above all, a call to shape the destiny of Bharat with self-reliance and unity. Listening to him, one could sense the weight of history and also the energy of the future. What stood out first was the way he described the atmosphere of the nation. From deserts to Himalayan peaks, from crowded cities to remote villages, the Tricolour was flying proudly. He connected that simple act of hoisting the national flag with a deep sense of unity, showing how 140 crore Indians are bound by a common love for the motherland.

The Prime Minister then bowed to the makers of the Constitution. His words reminded us that freedom is incomplete without the guiding principles of democracy. Names like Ambedkar, Rajendra Prasad, Nehru, Patel, and others were not just mentioned; they were celebrated for building a lighthouse that has guided India for 75 years. Importantly, he recalled the contributions of women like Hansa Mehta and Dakshayani Velayudhan, reminding us that India's progress has always been inclusive.

Another strong theme was national integrity. By remembering Dr. Syama Prasad Mookerjee and his sacrifice, Modi placed the removal of Article 370 in the larger framework of "One Nation, One Constitution." This was a fulfilment of a vision that India must remain united in spirit and in law. Yet the speech did not remain in history. It also reflected the present India—the "mini Bharat" visible at the Red Fort. From panchayat leaders to Drone Didis, from Lakhpati Didis to athletes, the audience itself represented the diversity and potential of the nation.

The part that struck me most deeply was his salute to the soldiers of Operation Sindoor. He spoke with raw honesty about the massacre at Pahalgam, where terrorists killed innocents in the most inhuman way. Instead of leaving that pain

unanswered, the government gave the army full freedom, and the result was a decisive operation that shook Pakistan. This was a declaration that Bharat has changed the rules: terrorism and its sponsors will no longer be treated separately. Both will face the same fate.

The Prime Minister went even further, breaking an old taboo: the Indus Waters Treaty. For decades, India's farmers have suffered while rivers watered fields across the border. His statement that "blood and water will not flow together" captured both anger and resolve. By signalling a review of this treaty, he reminded us that fairness must guide international agreements, and national interest cannot be ignored any longer.

The speech was not only about security and geopolitics. Its heartbeat was self-reliance—Atmanirbharta. He connected freedom itself with the ability to stand on our own feet. He reminded us that slavery had not only made us poor but had made us dependent, and that even after independence, dependency crept in quietly. To him, true dignity lies in not having to rely on others for essential needs.

He gave an example that felt very real: Operation Sindoor succeeded because the soldiers had "Made in India" weapons in their hands. Imagine, he said, what would have happened if we were dependent on foreign suppliers at that moment. His point was clear—self-reliance is not only economic, it is strategic, even existential.

The technology section of his speech was equally important. Modi did not hide the painful truth: India wasted 50–60 years by neglecting semiconductors. While other nations surged ahead, we lost time. But instead of mourning, he highlighted how today India is building six semiconductor units, and that before the year ends, the first Indian-made chips will reach the market. This was both a confession of past mistakes and a celebration of present progress.

Energy independence formed another strong pillar. He reminded us of how many lakhs of crores we wasted on oil, gas, and coal imports—money that could have been used for farmers, youth, and the poor. His pride was evident when he said India has already achieved 50% clean energy five years ahead of the 2030 target. With green hydrogen, nuclear expansion, and deepwater exploration, the goal is clear: by 2047, Bharat will not beg for energy—it will produce it. He also connected resources to future industries.

Speaking about astronaut Shubhanshu Shukla's return, about Gaganyaan, and about building a space station, he captured the excitement of a nation whose youth are entering a frontier once reserved for superpowers. The fact that 300

startups are already working in space technology shows how deeply innovation has spread. The appeal to young scientists and engineers was one of the strongest parts of the speech. Modi challenged them directly: should our fighter jets not have Indian jet engines? Should our pharmaceutical industry, already called the pharmacy of the world, not create its own patents and world-class medicines? By referring to the BioE3 policy, he was offering a framework for action. Data, AI, cyber security, and social media were not left out. He proudly noted how UPI has amazed the world—handling half of all global real-time transactions. But he also challenged the youth: why must India depend on foreign platforms? Why not build our own? This was an invitation to innovate.

Agriculture was placed alongside technology. Fertilizer dependence, he said, is another weakness. Overuse also damages the soil. He asked the youth and private sector to help develop Indian-made fertilizers suited to our needs. Similarly, in the EV revolution, he insisted India must not depend on imported batteries or panels. The logic was consistent: in every sector, self-reliance is the path to dignity.

The Covid experience was invoked to strengthen his point. When the world doubted, India built its own vaccines and the Co-Win platform, saving millions of lives. That spirit, he said, must now guide every field of innovation.

Women's empowerment came next. He praised self-help groups that were once neglected but now run businesses worth crores. He recalled how toys, once imported heavily, are now being exported because of Indian enterprise. These were small examples carrying a big lesson: when Indians are trusted and supported, they rise to the occasion. The National Manufacturing Mission was linked to MSMEs. Modi pointed out that global products already contain Indian-made components. But he urged that MSMEs must be strengthened under the philosophy of "Zero Defect, Zero Effect," which means quality without harming the environment. This balance of growth and responsibility has long-term significance.

The speech, when viewed as a whole, was more than a list of achievements. It was a philosophy of governance and a vision for the future. Its recurring theme was clear: self-reliance brings strength, dependence brings vulnerability. Freedom without self-reliance is incomplete.

When Prime Minister Narendra Modi spoke from the Red Fort on Independence Day, one moment stood out strongly—his reference to the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS). By placing the Sangh in his speech, he reminded the nation that India's progress is not the work of governments alone. It is the result of countless efforts—of saints, scientists, teachers, farmers, soldiers, and ordinary citizens—who together weave the fabric of Bharat. In this wide canvas of nation-building, the Sangh occupies a unique space.

The Prime Minister called the 100 years of the RSS a golden chapter in Indian history. His words were not just ceremonial; they reflected how the Sangh, with its ideals of service, discipline, and organisation, has become a living force in shaping society. To describe it as the world's largest NGO was more than a metaphor—it was recognition of the century-long, voluntary spirit of swayamsevaks who work without headlines, often unseen, but always with deep commitment to Maa Bharati. Saluting them from the Red Fort was both a tribute and a message: that the Sangh's model of nation-building through characterbuilding continues to inspire. It showed how institutions rooted in values and service can remain timeless, relevant, and central to India's story.

What impressed me was the tone. He did not only praise the government's work; he challenged the youth directly. He asked them to dream big, to bring forward their ideas, to take risks, and to demand changes in rules if needed. It was a message of partnership—between the state and its citizens. Listening to this speech, one could

sense both pride and urgency. Pride in how far we have come, and urgency that time is short. With 2047 only 22 years away, every moment counts. His appeal to not waste even a single moment captured the seriousness of his vision. In my opinion, this Independence Day speech was historic. It combined emotional pride in freedom with a detailed plan for the future. It reminded us of sacrifices made in the past while laying out a roadmap for a developed, strong, and self-reliant Bharat. If India can hold on to this spirit—of unity, courage, and self-reliance—there is no doubt that by 2047, the dream of a Viksit Bharat will be a reality we all live in.
